For more than four decades, the Carole Robertson Center for Learning has been committed to children and families, providing high-quality programming and services in historically marginalized and disinvested communities. In the Spring and Summer of 2021, as the COVID-19 pandemic continued, the Center achieved a series of unprecedented milestones. With this growth, the Center has established itself as one of the leading early childhood education and youth development organizations in Chicago, delivering comprehensive services to 2,000+ children and families across 27 communities.









RECENT MILESTONES

MARCH 2021

\$20 MILLION, 5-YEAR EARLY HEAD START EXPANSION AWARD

Through a competitive federal grant process, the Center received a \$20 million, five-year Early Head Start (EHS) Expansion grant from the Office of Head Start to serve an additional 185 infants, toddlers, and expectant mothers each year. EHS programs are free, federally funded programs that promote school readiness for children from low-income families.

JULY 2021

\$103 MILLION, 5-YEAR HEAD START & EARLY HEAD START AWARD

The Carole Robertson Center was one of six grantees of the federal government chosen to administer Head Start and Early Head Start programs in Chicago. This grant will enable the Center to serve a total of 666 Head Start and 513 Early Head Start children and their families.

AUGUST 2021

ACOUISITION OF ALBANY PARK COMMUNITY CENTER

The Carole Robertson Center's acquisition of the Center's third flagship site brought stability to the Albany Park community by expanding education programs for nearly 300 children and youth.

SEPTEMBER 2021

21ST CENTURY LEARNING GRANT AWARD

In Fall 2021, the Center secured increased OST funding as a recipient of a competitive 21st Century Learning Grant. With this increased funding, the Center has expanded its OST programming with a new school partner, Lawndale Community Academy.

EXPANDING OUT-OF-SCHOOL TIME (OST) PROGRAMS

More than 500 school-aged youth are served through OST programs at the Center's flagship sites and at school-based partners. The Center's OST programs foster a love of learning, build curiosity, and support young people's academic readiness, social-emotional skills, and identity development.


